The DEC Techniques d'éducation spécialisée programme trains people to provide appropriate adaptation, education and rehabilitation services. This work is carried out in close collaboration with various professionals such as psychoeducators, remedial teachers, psychologists, occupational therapists, etc.

This programme of study is suited to candidates who like people and know how to listen to their needs. These people prefer diversified work and enjoy human contact. The possibility of exerting a beneficial influence on people is a large part of their motivation. Openness to others, empathy and the ability to work as part of a team are essential characteristics.

What's more, the Lasalle College programme sets itself apart by emphasising the cultural diversity of the clientele it is likely to meet and support through its interventions.

LaSalle College offers its Special Education Techniques students real workplace experience through practical workshops and work placements. Internships can be carried out in a French- or English-speaking context, depending on the student's choice.

Training Objective

Special Care Counsellors are called upon to work with people who have difficulty with social integration, education or rehabilitation from various age groups: children, teens, adults, seniors.

or

Have obtained an equivalent education or an instruction deemed sufficient. Every case will be analysed by the College.

Work-Study Program (WSP)

Immunization

As part of their work placements, registered students may be asked to provide proof that their basic vaccinations are up to date: diphtheria, poliomyelitis, tetanus as well as rubella, mumps and measles, depending on the requirements of the work placement.

Important note: Students will be asked to provide proof that they have no legal impediments to completing their work placements. A request for a police record check must be made. This request will be paid for by the Collège.

Methods of Instruction

On-campus

• At the Montréal campus

Real-time remote learning

• Program given entirely at a distance, with a teacher and in real time (synchronous mode).

Sessions 1 to 6: it is possible for students to be present on campus twice per session for a maximum of 15 working days (not mandatory);

Internships (sessions 4 and 6) may be carried out remotely under the virtual supervision of a teacher.

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
